



The Selectmen's Corner by: Clarence Cummins

This year the Town's annual budget process begins several weeks earlier than it has in previous years. This is because the annual Town Meeting has been moved to early April instead of the usual early June date. A great deal of time and thought goes into preparing Richmond's annual budget. This year the Town Manager has instructed the Department Heads to prepare flat budgets. That means that the total budget for each department cannot exceed that department's budget for last year. The first thought that comes to mind is that it should be simple – just copy last year's budget and turn it in. It is not that easy. Almost without exception, departmental requirements change. For instance, Public Works may need more (or less) sand and salt for next winter. Equipment ages so that repair and replacement requirements will be different, and so forth. In addition, priorities shift from year to year and, the cost for everything from copier ink to repair parts continues to go up.

So, the question for every Department Head becomes: "How can I provide the same level of service, or even better service, with what in essence are less resources?" The preliminary

budgets submitted by the Department Heads start from this premise. But these budgets are only the beginning. The Budget Committee will review everything. They will hold several meetings, looking at each line item within each department's budget. The Department Heads will be questioned about their priorities and whether they really need x-dollars for tires, or that new generator, or whatever the line item may be. Later on in the process the Selectmen will review both the Department Head's request and the Budget Committee's recommendation. If there is a disagreement between the request and the recommendation much effort will be made to resolve the differences, based on the best possible understanding of the department's needs.

Although budget meetings – whether conducted by the Budget Committee, the Selectmen or joint meetings – may lack the excitement of a football game or Dancing with the Stars, they are very important to every resident of the Town. Public participation is strongly encouraged. We urge you to attend and let us know what your

thoughts are. We often hear concerns and objections at the Town Meeting but rarely hear them during the budget process. Come and let us know what you think during the process, not after we have completed it.

There are some items in the overall budget that are beyond the control of the Town. These include the Sagadahoc County taxes, which fortunately have remained relatively stable for several years, but may well increase in the future. The Richmond Water District, which is separate from the Town, charges the Town a hydrant rental fee. Last year that fee went up significantly. Then there is the School Budget which the Town has no control over it; a budget that increases each year.

As for those budget costs the Town can control our Town Manager and our Town employees work hard to use our tax dollars wisely. In recent years we have seen significant progress in the saving of money due to innovation, efficiency and a lot of leg work on part of various employees to obtain the best price for those products and services we must buy.



News from the Richmond Utilities District

The Richmond Utilities District has continued to work on I & I issues this summer and we wrapped up the last bit of phase 2 sewer construction on Main Street. We have made improvements to the wastewater treatment plant and have plans to upgrade the Front Street pumping station. We will be replacing a number of failed sewer service lines around Town and we appreciate the cooperation from homeowners. This work is part of the District's commitment to reduce overflows and to meet the demands of the Town of Richmond. We will be conducting more smoke testing on the 25th of August in areas where the District continues to experience high flows. As always, we will notify you if you are in an affected area.

The District will be collecting lead and cooper samples in September. The Drinking Water Program requires that these samples come from the taps of residential homes, so the District will coordinate this with customers when the time comes. If you receive a sample kit please follow the sampling instructions that are inside the kit. If you are not able to participate in the sampling please notify the District as soon as possi-

ble as this is a very time sensitive test.

The District will be applying for a loan of \$387,000 to complete water main upgrades on Main Street from the High School entrance east to High Street. These improvements will have to be made in the near future to accommodate lighting and sidewalk improvements the Town hopes to make this fall. The District originally planned on completing this work in 2014 as part of its capital improvements plan to avoid raising rates. However, if the town goes forward with its plan to install and replace sidewalks over the century-old water main, it is likely the District will have to raise rates again in 2012 to coordinate the replacement of the old water main with the lighting and sidewalk project and to begin repayment of the loan ahead of the previous capital improvement plan.

The District has recently raised its rates at the recommendation of Maine Rural Water Association (MRWA). MRWA was hired by the District to complete the required rate case for the Maine Public Utilities Commission. MRWA looked

at our debts, capital improvement plan, incorporated depreciation and came up with the necessary increase for the District. Since the rates had increased minimally over the past few years. Our rates were, and remain, some of the lowest in the state. The increased rates allow us to borrow funds at lower interest rates to make progress on our capital improvement plan and avoid raising rates higher and higher to pay for the projects. As a result, the town's cost of fire protection, also known as hydrant rental, has increased. By Maine law, 30% of the District's revenues must come from fire protection and is beyond the control of the District.

The District would like to thank Regina Flower for her service to the District for the past 32 years. Regina has been an instrumental part of the District's day to day operations and she will be missed. The Trustees staff and I would like to thank her for all of her support and tireless efforts.

New building codes are in effect. Please call or email any questions about your project. If you have questions regarding codes or permit requirements related to your project please contact me at 737-4305 ext. 205, I am available to meet with you. The plumbing permit fees were raised by the State for internal and external systems, your permits will now be \$10./per fixture with a minimum fee of \$40. for internal plumbing. External

plumbing (septic systems) fees are \$250. for non-engineered systems, \$200 for engineered systems, Disposal Field \$150., and replacement tank \$150., these are the most common fees.

There have been concerns and complaints about junk cars, metals and debris. To avoid receiving a letter from the CEO to voluntarily clean any debris, you can dispose of certain items at the

Richmond Holding Area. The two closest scrap metal recyclers are Grimmel Industries located in Topsham 1-800-769-9701 and Clark's Car Crushing located in Farmingdale 207-623-1725.

The charge for work started before the issuance of a building permit is presently DOUBLE the permit fee.



The Richmond Food Pantry has now been opened for 3 months offering food for those in need at 7 different times. The pantry is located in the dining room of the DRUM Church located at 121 Pleasant Street. The food pantry is open the first Wednesday of the month from 4-6p.m. and the third Saturday of the month from 2-4p.m.

We currently have over 60 volunteers and we have over 100 clients representing about 300 family members. About 90% of the clients are from Richmond. We are now trying to expand the pantry into the Dresden area. Due to the cost of holding the food pantry, we will be holding several fund raising events during the balance of 2011:
