TOWN MEETING WARRANT ARTICLES, CONT.

ARTICLE 16. To see what sum the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$1,525,346** for the Town of Richmond Municipal Budget. The Selectboard and Budget Committee make the following recommendations.

\$504,533 Intergovernmental
\$266,492 Benefits
\$55,300 Insurance
\$25,000 General Assistance
\$427,881 Debt
\$186,990 Capital Outlay
\$27,300 Legal Services

ARTICLE 17. RESERVE

Selectboard Recommends/Budget Committee Recommends: **\$82,500**

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of **\$2,685** for the support of **Mid-coast Maine Community Action (MMCA)** services in the Richmond area. MMCA provides the community with Head Start, WIC, emergency fuel and housing assistance, surplus food distribution, Family Development Case Management, and affordable rental housing. **Note: Submitted by petition.**

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town shall authorize the Selectboard to enter into an interlocal agreement with the municipalities of Gardiner, Bowdoinham and Topsham to facilitate the planning, construction and maintenance of a regional multi-use trail known as the Merrymeeting Trail; pursuant to the Maine Interlocal Cooperation Act, 30-A M.R.S.A. 2201-2208.

Note: Said Agreement to be “legally binding” only if accepted by all other aforementioned municipalities.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to enact the 2013 Amendments to the Town of Richmond Land Use Ordinance.

Note: The proposed ordinance amendments are available for review and inspection at the Town Clerk’s Office and will be available as an attachment to the Town Meeting Warrant.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard to enter into a lease, for a term not to exceed ten (10) years, with the Richmond Area Food Pantry, Incorporated for the use of a portion of the Town-owned property at 15 Spruce Street (Tax Map U01, Lot 117) more particularly described as the former church building of St. Matthias Episcopal Church, together with the non-exclusive right to park on the site, on such terms and conditions as the Board of Selectmen deems to be in the best interests of the Town.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will vote to fix the date when property taxes become due and payable with the first payment being due and payable on November 10, 2014; and the second payment being due and payable on May 11, 2015; and to set the interest rate charged annually on all property taxes remaining unpaid after the due dates pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 505(4) at 7% and to set the interest rate to be paid by the Town on abated taxes at 3% pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506-A, and to authorize such interest paid or abatements granted to be appropriated from overlay funds or, if necessary, from undesignated fund balance and to authorize the tax collector or treasurer to accept prepayments of taxes not yet committed pursuant to 36 M.R.S.A. § 506, with no interest to accrue on any excess prepaid over the amount finally committed.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard to apply for State, federal (including Community Development Block Grants) and other grants on the Town's behalf for purposes deemed by the Selectmen to be in the best interests of the Town; to accept such grants, including, when necessary, the authority to sign contract and related documents and to accept conditions of approval; and to appropriate such grant funds for any purpose for which the Town has appropriated funds in Fiscal Year 2014-2015.

ARTICLE 24. To see what action the Town will vote to take regarding the **appropriation of all money received from** State Municipal Revenue Sharing; General Assistance Reimbursement; State Aid to Education; Civil Emergency/E.M.A. Funds; 50% of all snowmobile registration reimbursement; Tree Growth reimbursement; Veterans Exemption reimbursement; State Park fee sharing; Homestead Property Exemption reimbursement; fees from the State through Public Library State Aid per Capita; and all other fees and funding not legally and specifically designated as reimbursements or credits to accounts or legally designated for other purposes.

Selectboard Recommends: Reduce tax commitment, except as otherwise provided by law
Budget Committee Recommends: Same

ARTICLE 25. To see what action the Town will vote to take regarding the use of all money received from the state Local Roads Assistance Program (or any similar program intended to subsidize local roads) for the maintenance of town ways.

Selectboard Recommends: Dedicate to eligible road improvements as defined by current MDOT standards
Budget Committee Recommends: Same

ARTICLE 26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectboard to sell by sealed bid or public auction and to convey by quitclaim deed any real estate acquired by the Town for non-payment of taxes thereon, or, if the property is prior-owner occupied residential property, to convey the property to the prior owner upon payment in full of all taxes, interest and charges incurred by the Town within 90 days of notice to the prior owner of the repurchase opportunity.

ARTICLE 27. To see if the Town will vote to increase the property tax levy limit established for Richmond by State law in the event that the municipal budget approved under the preceding articles will result in a tax commitment that is greater than that property tax levy limit.

NOTE: If this article is needed, a written ballot is required.

CODE ENFORCEMENT BY: JAMES VALLEY

At this year's Town Meeting there will be a warrant article pertaining to amendments to the Town of Richmond Land Use Ordinance. These amendments strictly deal with Manufactured Homes in the Town of Richmond by setting new standards and requirements for placing a new or older manufactured home within the town limits. Examples of these are:

-No manufactured housing unit that was manufactured before June 15, 1976 may be brought into the Town of Richmond unless suitable evidence is provided to the Code Enforcement Officer that the unit does not contain aluminum electrical wiring, that the unit contains two exterior exits, and that the roof is constructed to support a live load of thirty pounds per square foot.

-Manufactured housing units may be placed or installed on lots where single-family dwelling units are allowed.

-The unit shall be at least fourteen feet in width and thirty-two feet in length.

The new library will host a reading and discussion program for adults this summer. **(See article on next page.)**





COMMUNITY & BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT UPDATE

The Community & Business Development office continues to be busy with a challenging and interesting variety of projects! These are just some of the initiatives the office is working on:

Community Development

- Facilitating the Comprehensive Plan update process:
 - * We have completed a Demographics chapter and updated Land Use map, with technical assistance provided free of charge by Midcoast Council of Governments (MCOG) with state funding.
 - * Facilitated completion by Comprehensive Plan Committee of the Historic Resources chapter.
 - * Currently working on a Pedestrian and Bicycle Plan, with technical assistance by MCOG, as part of our Transportation chapter.
- Solicited \$18,000 in funding from foundations for library interior, furnishings, and outdoor landscaping.
- Successful application to Maine Humanities Council for an upcoming facilitated book discussion series for the new library.
- Organized and facilitated a Young Adult Advisory Committee for the new library.
- Completed grant proposal to the CDBG Program (pending) to complete our Main Street Streetscapes project with additional sidewalk reconstruction, lighting and other amenities.
- Submitting grant proposal to the MaineDOT Small Harbor Improvement Program (SHIP) for additional shoreline stabilization work and new docks at our waterfront.
- Continue to advocate for, seek funding for and carry out sidewalk and trails projects, including the Gardiner Street sidewalk and trail, Merrymeeting Trail, and Town Forest.

Business Development and Attraction

- Beginning work this spring on an Economic Development plan that will help us strategically develop action items on business retention, expansion and attraction.
- Have placed business attraction advertisements and tourism marketing pieces in MaineBiz, Allure of the Coast (Southern Midcoast Chamber), Maine Office of Tourism, and Activities Guide of Maine.
- Initiating a Downtown TIF District Building Façade Challenge Grant program this spring.
- Working with the Midcoast Economic Development District (MCEDD) on a regional Brownfields Assessment project, which will fund assessment (and eventually clean-up and redevelopment) of one or two historic buildings in our Downtown TIF District.
- Continue to sit on both the MCOG and MCEDD Boards to ensure our place in regional economic and community development initiatives, as well as remain active with the Southern Midcoast Chamber of Commerce.

Community Events

- Continue to organize Richmond Days, Halloween, Tree Lighting, and other community events.
- Continue to work closely with the State for Swan Island, the Southard Museum and other regional attractions on marketing and joint promotion.
